Dear United Women in Faith Readers,

Blessings to you and greetings!

I am writing to you from a new space, as our family moved this year. There are lots of tasks associated with moving and most of them are, in my opinion, a bit of a slog. Negotiating a new lease, a lot of scrubbing, packing and unpacking an embarrassing number of cardboard boxes—these are all a necessary part of changing homes, yet none rank high on my personal "Sounds Like Fun" list.

There is, however, one administrative task of moving that I've long cherished: the ritual of getting a new local public library card. This year's visit was particularly special because I was joined by my son, who, for the first time, got a library card of his own. He's not old enough to read, though he does have a few books memorized well enough that he may fool an extremely gullible novice. Still, like so many young children, even before he has learned to decode the letters and words himself, he has come to appreciate the great gift of books. He revels in the many worlds contained within a handful of paper glued between a couple flaps of cardboard. He remains ever ready to cram in "just one more" before bedtime.

Low-tech and affordable, books remain an incomparable tool in our spiritual toolbox. Reading can offer us solace and adventure, a balm for the heart, and challenge to the mind, a chance to journey far afield and a chance, ultimately, to come home to our own deepest selves. Amid the many changes that life inevitably brings, books remain a powerful companion.

As you explore the 2024 Reading Program, you'll find much that remains familiar:

- Several reading plans from which to choose.
- Books spanning five key categories (Spiritual Growth, Social Action, Leadership Development, Education for Mission, and Nurturing for Community).
- Reading meant to inspire faithful and informed action on behalf of women, children, and youth.

You'll also find a few new or enhanced features we hope you'll enjoy:

- An expanded selection of books offering more choice for readers.
- A larger number of youth and children's book selections, including several intentionally paired sets to facilitate intergenerational programming.
- A new virtual page at **bookshop.org/shop/uwfaith** where you can browse and purchase *most* of the 2024 Reading Program books while earning 10% back for the organization.

In addition, we will continue our national virtual offerings in 2024, including quarterly live events (small group book discussions and author talks) and a Mighty Networks discussion platform group called Reading Enthusiasts, where you can post, learn about upcoming events, and share with others about your favorite books.

• Where can I find the books?

You can access books at your public library, from your local bookstore, or through an online retailer. Starting this year, you can also purchase most of the 2024 Reading Program books at **bookshop.org/shop/uwfaith**. United Women in Faith receives 10% back on all purchases from our virtual shelves.



How do I earn a Reading Program certificate?

Recognition of Reading Program participation is handled at the district and/ or conference level of United Women in Faith. Please reach out to your district/conference leadership team for the relevant details about where and when to submit your reporting form to receive recognition for completing one of the reading plans.



What resources support intergenerational learning?

The 2024 list includes four intergenerational book "sets," where an adult book is paired with a companion book to facilitate intergenerational reading and learning for youth or children. Book sets include *Blessed Youth, Braiding Sweetgrass, Carved in Ebony, and The 1619 Project*.

BONUS BOOKS





We are happy to recommend four 2024 Bonus Books. Each Bonus Book counts for 2 Reading Program reporting credits. This year's Bonus Books are organized around the theme **Love Your Neighbor**.

Love Your Neighbor in the World.

These thought-provoking, challenging, and inspiring books invite us into a deeper understanding of U.S. history, our relationships with one another, and our relationship with the natural world.

- Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge and the Teachings of Plants, by Robin Wall Kimmerer.
- The 1619 Project: A New Origin Story by Nikole Hannah-Jones.

Both books have a companion volume for younger readers, which is also included in the 2024 Reading Program: *Braiding Sweetgrass for Young Adults* (for youth) and *The 1619 Project: Born on the Water* (for children). You may want to explore possibilities for intergenerational reading and study in your church or at your local unit, where adults and children/youth read parallel texts and engage together in discussion about the books' themes.

Love Your Neighbor in The United Methodist Church.

These books, both published by Abingdon (UMC publishing house), highlight the experiences of United Methodist leaders, and invite us into timely deep reflection about how to love our neighbor and ourselves in our United Methodist Church.


- Our Strangely Warmed Hearts: Coming Out into God's Call, by Karen P. Oliveto.
- I'm Black. I'm Christian. I'm Methodist, edited by Rudy Rasmus.

Both books explore The United Methodist Church's recent history and present challenges and possibilities through engaging personal testimonies, biblical reflection, and historical insight. Each book includes multiple voices and varied stories, since there are many experiences of what it means to be a United Methodist. You may want to explore possibilities for a group study on United Methodism, where the group reads and discusses both books as a form of deeper engagement with the vital questions facing our denomination today. We may not agree with every perspective we read, but we believe these voices are powerful and worth lifting for such a time as this.



About Mission u: Each year, Mission u offers curricula for children, youth, and adults around one biblical or theological theme, with emphasis on spiritual growth, social action, and the global ministry of the church.

- Mission u 2023: Jesus' teachings in the Gospels proclaim the good news of the kin-dom or reign (basileia) of God. In fact, Jesus mentions the kin-dom 90 times in the Synoptic Gospels! What does the Bible tell us about God's basileia and why do we call it the kin-dom? For Jesus, the kin-dom was not simply something to talk about, but something we could live and experience. From the Lord's Prayer to the Beatitudes to the parables, this good news is at the heart of Jesus' preaching, teaching, and ministry.
- Mission u 2024: The 2024 Mission u curricula continues the theme of Living the Kin-dom, deepening our study of the ways Jesus preached and ministered a proximity to the kin-dom among the marginalized. We will focus on the ways Jesus invites us to transform our lives, our selves, and our communities in ways that bring us closer to the reign of God.
- Several movies are also available for Reading Program reporting credit, including Hidden Figures, Pushout, and The Hate U Give. In determining the category for credit, identify the category of the original book and apply credit for the film to the same category








30 DAYS WITH E STANLEY JONES: GLOBAL PREACHER, SOCIAL JUSTICE PROPHET

JOHN HARNISH

READTHE SPIRIT BOOKS (2022)

Dive into 30 short, inspiring true stories about the life of E. Stanley Jones (1884-1973), described as the "greatest missionary since Saint Paul" in his day. Twice nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize for his ministry work in India, Jones was an author, statesman, interfaith leader, and a spokesman for peace, racial inclusion, and social justice. His work brought him into close contact with Mahatma Gandhi and other Indian leaders, and his writings are said to have influenced Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s nonviolent approach to injustice. Here, Harnish illustrates the timeless, loving wisdom that Jones believed lay at the core of Christianity.



THE 1619 PROJECT: A NEW ORIGIN STORY (FOR ADULTS)


NIKOLE HANNAH-JONES

RANDOM HOUSE/ONE WORLD (2021)

The 1619 Project is an exploration of the meaning and overall impact of slavery on American life. Produced in August 2019, the 400-year anniversary of the arrival of the first enslaved people to Virginia, it retells United States history through essays, photos, and podcasts. Ultimately, The 1619 Project addresses the impact of slavery on the nation's foundational ideals, economy, health care system, racial segregation, music, and more, examining the systems of race and caste that still operate in America today.


THE BOOK OF ROSY: A MOTHER'S STORY OF SEPARATION AT THE BORDER

ROSAYRA PABLO CRUZ AND JULIE SCHWIETERT HARPERONE (2020)

This wrenching story shares the plight of the many families separated at the United States and Mexico border. Here, Rosayra "Rosy" Pablo Cruz pens her agonizing tale of seeking asylum in the U.S. after fleeing her home country of Guatemala with her two young boys. After the brutal journey, they arrived at the Arizona border—only to be seized and forcibly separated under the Department of Homeland Security's new "zero tolerance" policy. She shares her painful but inspiring story about the cruelty of detention and the unbearable agony of being separated from her children in a strange land.









THE PFDION MISSION (2014)

Penned by longtime Compassion International child ministry expert Dan Brewster, this book addresses the topic of ministry to children in totality, ultimately focusing on the most critical issues and needs. It practically examines how to reach, equip, and empower children to maximize their transformational impact and mobilize them for continuing impact throughout the rest of their lives. As Brewster notes, God often accomplishes the work of the kingdom of God through the very special abilities of the children. The book is lauded as a resource for ministers, seminarians, teachers, and other child advocates.




THE DEATH AND LIFE OF AIDA HERNANDEZ: A BORDER STORY

AARON BOBROW-STRAIN

FARRAR, STRAUS AND GIROUX/PICADOR (2019)

This book tells the story of a Mexican teen mother, Aida, journeying through the U.S. immigration system and the obstacles she faces. Aida was born in Mexico in 1987. When Aida was 8 years old, her mother took her and her siblings to live in Arizona, where she grew up undocumented. After her deportation, Aida found herself in a Mexican city marked by violence, in a country not hers, and separated from her son. To get back to the United States and reunite with her son, she embarked on a harrowing journey, enduring detention centers, immigration courts, and more.




DEFIANT: WHAT THE WOMEN OF EXODUS TEACH US ABOUT FREEDOM

KELLY NIKONDEHA EERDMANS (2020)

The women of Exodus defied Pharaoh, raised Moses, and plundered Egypt. They summoned courage, harnessed intelligence, and gathered resources to enact justice in many small ways and overturned an empire. Today, women find themselves in similar circumstances. *Defiant* reflects on the resistance literature of Exodus and what it has to offer women, as well as the deep work women do to create conditions for liberation in their church, community, and country. Nikondeha shares how what the women of Exodus accomplished under the oppression of Pharaoh might unlock for us as we imagine our mandate under modern systems of injustice.








THE HOUSETHAT LOVE BUILT: WHY I OPENED MY DOOR TO IMMIGRANTS AND HOW WE FOUND HOPE BEYOND A BROKEN SYSTEM

SARAH JACKSON ZONDERVAN (2020)


What does it mean to love our neighbor? That is the question at the heart of this story, authored by one woman who experienced transformation after she opened her home to immigrants. Once, Jackson thought immigration justice was administered through walls and fences. Then she met a deported young father separated from his U.S.-citizen family, and everything changed. As she began to meet families ravaged by threats in their homeland, biblical justice took on a new meaning. The work she began through Casa de Paz joined the Christian tradition of hospitality, shining light on what it means to love our neighbor.



HOW BEAUTIFUL WE WERE: A NOVEL

IMBOLO MBUE RANDOM HOUSE (2021)

What happens when the reckless drive for profit, coupled with the ghost of colonialism, comes up against one community's determination to hold on to its ancestral land? In *How Beautiful We Were*, a fearless young woman, Thula, from the small fictional African village of Kosawa, starts a revolution against an American oil company. In Kosawa, the people have been living in fear because of the environmental degradation there, from pipeline spills harming farmlands to children dying from drinking toxic water. Left with few choices, the people of Kosawa decide to fight back.




I'M BLACK, I'M CHRISTIAN, I'M METHODIST,

In this book, edited by Dr. Rudy Rasmus, personal narratives from 10 men and women reveal the distinct struggles of being Black in the church, facing both historic and modern racism. While the essays each begin with the central identities of Black, Christian, and Methodist, they also represent different journeys of confronting centuries of White supremacy in religious and secular institutions. Weaving together autobiography and spiritual formation, they represent a significant contribution to our theological understanding of racism.








INVISIBLE CHILD: POVERTY, SURVIVAL, AND HOPE IN AN AMERICAN CITY

ANDREA ELLIOT RANDOM HOUSE (2021)


The winner of the J. Anthony Lukas Book Prize and a finalist for the Bernstein Award, this book follows eight dramatic years in the life of Dasani, a precocious and imaginative girl living in a homeless shelter in Brooklyn. Elliott weaves the story of Dasani's childhood with the history of her ancestors, tracing their passage from slavery to the Great Migration north. As Dasani comes of age, New York City's homeless crisis has exploded, deepening the chasm between rich and poor. She must guide her siblings through a world riddled by hunger, violence, racism, drug addiction, and the threat of foster care.



LETYOUR LIGHT SHINE: MOBILIZING FOR JUSTICE WITH CHILDREN AND YOUTH

REGINALD BLOUNT AND VIRGINIA LEE FRIENDSHIP PRESS (2019)

What can we do about the plethora of harsh situations children face today, such as broken immigration policies, hunger, school shootings, mass incarceration, human trafficking, and failing schools? Advocacy might well be the answer. This collection of writings on advocacy for children and theological education mobilizes readers by educating about the history and goals of the Children's Defense Fund, including the passion of founder Marian Wright Edelman. Child advocacy is also woven throughout the book with religious core values, illuminating the faith aspect of helping children have a voice. The book also covers the Freedom Schools movement of the 1960s, as well as the CDF's contemporary Freedom Schools.



APPLE: SKINTOTHE CORE

ERIC GANSWORTH LEVINE QUERIDO (2020)


In many Native American communities, the term "apple" is a racial slur referring to a person who is "Red on the outside, White on the inside," meaning one who looks like an Indigenous person but acts "White." In this bittersweet but inspiring poetic memoir, the author reclaims the term, transforming the slur through the retelling of his own narrative. An Onondaga writer and visual artist raised in the Tuscarora Nation, Gansworth explores the terrible legacy of government boarding schools and addresses identity and belonging as he struggles with appropriation, language, family ties, friendship, feeling lost, and leaving home for college.

This *New York Times* bestselling graphic novel is a memoir detailing the childhood of George Takei, actor, author, and activist. Takei spent his childhood imprisoned with his family within American concentration camps during World War II. *They Called Us Enemy* is his firsthand account of those years behind barbed wire, the experience of growing up under legalized racism, his mother's hard choices, his father's faith in democracy, and the way those experiences planted the seeds for his astonishing future.


THIRTY TALKS WEIRD LOVE

ALESSANDRA N. VARELA
CINCO PUNTOS PRESS (2021)

This is a moving story of a girl on the cusp of womanhood who learns to empathize with others—and ultimately to care for herself. Thirteen-year-old Anamaría is struggling both with depression and with understanding what's truly important as she grows up in Ciudad Juárez, México. Enter her 30-year-old self, who pays a surprise visit to Anamaría. Anamaría doesn't want to trust this stranger, who insists she's from the future. Mean-while, she's mourning the tragedy plaguing her city—the disappearance of young girls and women that is becoming increasingly common.

THE 1619 PROJECT: BORN ON THE WATER (FOR CHILDREN)

NIKOLE HANNAH-JONES KOKILA (2021)

Hannah-Jones collaborated with children's book author Renée Watson to produce this companion piece. A children's picture book written in verse, it serves to help young people understand the important concepts addressed in the original—notably, the impact of slavery on American's foundational principles. In the children's version, the book explores a perspective from a young Black girl tasked in school to draw a flag that represents her ancestral land. At first she doesn't understand her family's past, but soon the girl talks with her grandmother and learns the truth about her lineage.

BLUE: A HISTORY OF THE COLOR AS DEEP AS THE SEA AND AS WIDE AS THE SKY

NANA EKUA BREW-HAMMOND KNOPF BOOKS FOR YOUNG READERS (2022)

This riveting exploration of culture and history traces the journey of the color through time and across the globe. The color blue has been long sought-after, from the mass quantities of sapphire rocks ground by ancient Afghan painters, to the snails harvested in Eurasia for the tiny bits of blue contained in their bodies, to the indigo grown as a cash crop on the backs of African slaves. In this beautifully rendered children's book, discover a history of the color as deep as the sea and as wide as the sky.

From award-winning author and National Geographic photographer Jan Reynolds comes the Spanish-language version of her remarkable and illustrative photography book, skillfully and beautifully detailing the ancient ritual of the cycle of water and the cycle of rice in Bali from temples to fields and from seeds to rice-bearing plants. Woven throughout is information on Balinese spiritual ritual practices and the dangers of overproduction into the explanation of this tiny but powerful grain. Readers come away with a poignant and critical message on responsible stewardship.






EL MANGLE: SEMBRANDO ARBOLES PARA ALIMENTAR FAMILIAS /THE MANGROVETREE: PLANTINGTREESTO FEED FAMILIES

SUSAN L. ROTH AND CINDYTRUMBORE LEE & LOW BOOKS (2021)

Now available in both English and Spanish, Susan L. Roth and Cindy Trumbore's *The Mangrove Tree* uses powerful prose and pictures to capture this poignant look at an ecological innovation project in the village of Hargigo in the impoverished African nation of Eritrea. The book details Dr. Gordon Sato's idea to plant mangrove trees there, which grow easily in salt water, ultimately providing profound long-term benefits for the community. Also included are many photographs of Sato and the people of Hargigo, bringing their inspiring story into real-world perspective.

STEPPING STONES: A REFUGEE FAMILY'S JOURNEY MARGRIET RUURS

ORCA BOOK PUBLISHERS (2016)

This dual-language (English/Arabic) book shares the story of a young girl, Rama, who with her multigenerational family is forced to flee her once-peaceful village to escape the ravages of civil war. The book was inspired by the stone artwork of Syrian artist Nizar Ali Badr, discovered by chance by Canadian writer Margriet Ruurs, who has authored more than 40 children's books. The author was impressed with Badr's work and, using many of his already-created pieces, set out to create a story about the Syrian refugee crisis, allowing the human side of the situation to speak louder than the political.





QIAN JULIE WANG DOUBLEDAY (2021)

Seven-year-old Qian arrives in New York full of curiosity—and over-whelmed by fear and scarcity. While in Chinese, the word for America translates to "beautiful country," her new life is anything but beautiful. Formerly professors, now Qian's parents labor in sweatshops and fight constantly, desperate to survive in poverty in the richest country in the world. Shunned by her classmates for her limited English, Qian turns to books—and small joys that keep her going. *This New York Times* best-seller reveals a family fracturing under the weight of invisibility, and a girl coming of age in the shadows, who never stops seeking the light.



BECOMING BRAVE: FINDING COURAGETO PURSUE RACIAL JUSTICE NOW

BRENDA SALTER MCNEIL BRAZOS PRESS (2020)

Are you brave enough to break the silence and work with others to dismantle systems of injustice and inequality? Speaker, author, professor, and thought leader Dr. Brenda Salter McNeil offers a distinctly Christian framework for addressing systemic injustice, challenging Christians to be everyday activists. Through the lens of the biblical narrative of Esther, McNeil challenges Christian reconcilers to recognize the particular pain in our world and work together to repair what is broken while maintaining a deep hope in God's ongoing work for justice. This book provides education and prophetic inspiration for every person who wants to take reconciliation seriously.








FIERCE LOVE: A BOLD PATH TO FEROCIOUS COURAGE AND RULE-BREAKING KINDNESS THAT CAN HEALTHE WORLD

REV. DR. JACQUI LEWIS HARMONY (2021)


In this book, Lewis addresses how embracing the tenets of ubuntu can help bring about the change we seek in a world divided. Race and ethnicity, caste and color, gender and sexuality, class and education, and religion and political party have become demographic labels that reduce differences to simplistic categories in which "we" are vehemently against "them." But Lewis's own experience—of being the first female and first Black minister in her church's history, of being in an interracial marriage, and of making peace with childhood abuse—illustrates how empathy and forgiveness are the key to reversing these ugly trends.


HIGH CONFLICT: WHY WE GETTRAPPED AND HOW WE GET OUT




THE NICKEL BOYS / LOS CHICOS DE NICKEL


THE RAGE OF INNOCENCE: HOW AMERICA CRIMINALIZES BLACKYOUTH







Examining organizing processes in Mississippi, Los Angeles, Chicago, and other localities, he shows how relatively small groups of community members built the power to win policy changes to reduce suspensions and expulsions by combining deep local organizing with resources from the national movement.




I AM YOU: A BOOK ABOUT UBUNTU



THE 1619 PROJECT: A NEW ORIGIN STORY (FOR ADULTS)


NIKOLE HANNAH-JONES RANDOM HOUSE/ONE WORLD (2021)

The 1619 Project is an exploration of the meaning and overall impact of slavery on American life. Produced in August 2019, the 400-year anniversary of the arrival of the first enslaved people to Virginia, it retells United States history through essays, photos, and podcasts. Ultimately, The 1619 Project addresses the impact of slavery on the nation's foundational ideals, economy, health care system, racial segregation, music, and more, examining the systems of race and caste that still operate in America today.



As a botanist, Kimmerer is trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. As a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, she embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. Here, she brings these two lenses together. Drawing on her life as an Indigenous scientist and a woman, Kimmerer shows how other living beings offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. She circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of ecological consciousness requires acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world.
